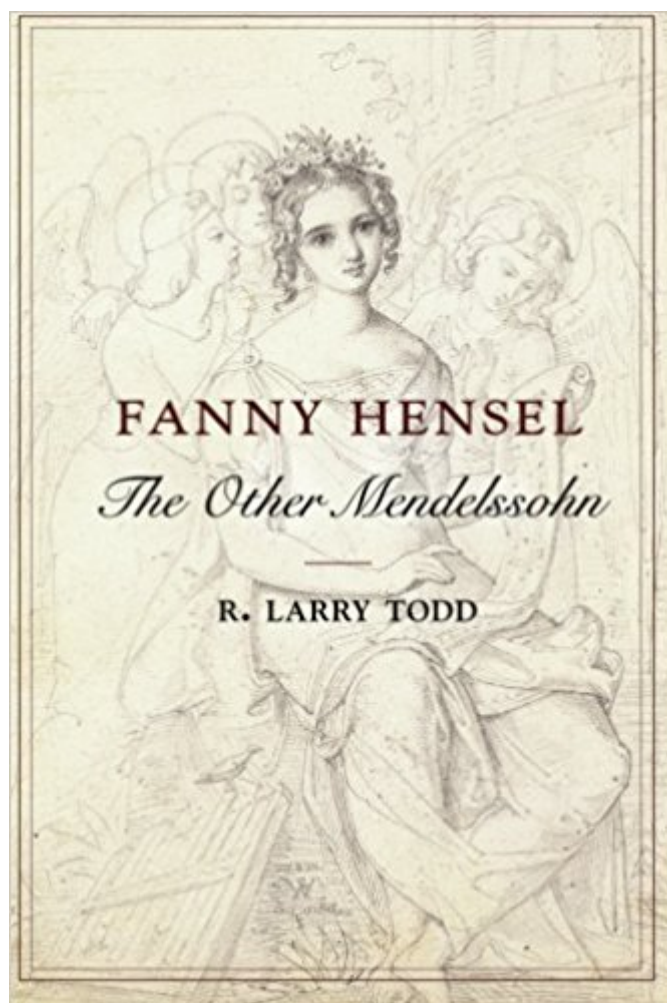


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Fanny Hensel: The Other Mendelssohn



Synopsis

Granddaughter of the philosopher Moses Mendelssohn and sister of the composer Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy, Fanny Hensel (1805-1847) was an extraordinary musician who left well over four hundred compositions, most of which fell into oblivion until their rediscovery late in the twentieth century. In *Fanny Hensel: The Other Mendelssohn*, R. Larry Todd offers a compelling, authoritative account of Hensel's life and music, and her struggle to emerge as a publicly recognized composer.

Recognized in the *New Yorker* as "Mendelssohn's most authoritative biographer," R. Larry Todd is Arts and Sciences Professor at Duke University. A Guggenheim Fellow and Fellow of the National Humanities Center, he is the author of *Mendelssohn: A Life in Music*, named Best Biography in 2003 by the Association of American Publishers. He has recently returned to his pianist roots and released his first CD, of Mendelssohn's complete cello works, with internationally acclaimed cellist Nancy Green for JRI Recordings.

Great book. Very well done.

I've been a fan of R. Larry Todd's biographic work on the Mendelssohns for quite a while, and this new bio of Felix Mendelssohn's unjustly overlooked sister was marvelous. She was easily as talented as her famous younger brother, and was only less known because she was an upper-class woman, for whom a career as a composer/ conductor/performer wouldn't do. This bio would be excellent for anyone interested in women's studies or music history. Highly recommended.

You will not find here a book truly about Fanny Mendelssohn the person, but about technical musical analysis of her pieces, many of them compared, unfavourably, to other musicians who set music to the same lyrics or otherwise made similar pieces. Her music trajectory is also compared, also unfavourably, to the more talented, "genius", of her brother Felix, thus the title of the book. No gender analysis, no deeper historical research on documents beside music scores that would have further our knowledge of the character. She deserved better.

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
